# **Annual Report: Department of Counseling**

### NON-ACADEMIC AFFAIRS UNITS ONLY: Highlights of the Year: ACADEMIC AFFAIRS UNITS: Goal #1:

- All four counseling specialty areas received positive CACREP accreditation decisions. For the M.A. degree- Addiction Counseling, Clinical Mental Health Counseling, and School Counseling Accredited: Eight-Year Period through October 31, 2025. The Counselor Education and Supervision (Ph.D. degree) Accredited: Eight-Year Period through October 31, 2025.
- Dr. Clare Merlin-Knoblich served as a Cato College of Education Teaching Faculty Fellow (2018-2019 school year).
- Dr. Kristie Opiola was selected as a Cato College of Education Teaching Faculty Fellow for 2019-2020.
- Dr. Sejal Foxx 2018, (PI) along with Dr. Brett Tempest (PI) and Co-PI's Dr. Stephanie Galloway and Dr. Chance Lewis. Developing Engineering Academic Pathways for Low Income Students. National Science Foundation. \$999,591.00, Funded.
- Dr. Phyllis Post engaged in a research project with Koontz Elementary School in Salisbury, NC with intentional focus to provide child teacher relationship training to the teachers in the school.
- Dr. Kristie Opiola and Dr. Alston (REEL) co taught a new undergraduate course in the fall 2018 semester they co created for pre-service teachers (EDUC 4000): Topics in Education: Teacher Training for Class-room Behaviors and Classroom Management. The purpose of this course was to help students expand their understanding of student's misbehavior and become more responsive to students needs within their classroom.
- The Department of Counseling for the 2018 calendar year had 9 graduates from Ph.D. Program in Counselor Education and Supervision and 60 from the MA Program in Counseling.
- Maylee Vasquez, first year doctoral student was recipient of a 2019 NBCC Minority Fellowship award. This is a national competitive award that strives to ensure "the mental health of all Americans are met, regardless of language or culture, thereby reducing health disparities and improving overall community health and well-being" (nbccf.org).
- The 2018 recipients of the Sheila McCullough Memorial Scholarship winners were Jason Frost and Janaye Simpson. Mary Thomas Burke Endowed Scholarship recipients were Julie Dumbaugh and Krystal Turner.
- 57 out 62 MA students successfully passed the Counselor Preparatory Comprehensive Exam (CPCE) 91% pass rate.

## **Examples of Data-Based Improvements :**

1. As a result of 2017 -2018 data from doctoral comprehensive exam results from our doctoral comprehensive exam process over the past along with feedback from doctoral alumni, the decision was made to change comps to a take home process. Students now have a period 8 days to respond to 4 different questions in the areas of Counseling Theory, Multicultural counseling, Research, and Counseling Supervision. One of our goals is for doctoral students to have the opportunity to answer the questions in a more comprehensive manner.

2. During the time frame beginning in 2017, enrollment numbers in the Play Therapy Concentration and the Graduate Certificate in Play Therapy Program was at 17. As a mechanism to increase enrollment numbers another course was created in hybrid format to increase enrollment numbers. The course: CSLG 7147 Multicultural and Social Justice Advocacy in Play Therapy, is being taught at the 600 level Spring semester with an enrollment of 15. Enrollment number will be re-evaluated in 2019 for both program areas.

3. Based upon formal and informal feedback gathered from students, the Department created a survey exploring course scheduling needs-more specifically when courses are offered & in what format (traditional, synchronous, asynchronous, weekends, etc). At this point this data will be analyzed and factored into consideration for future course scheduling.
